

Review of rural health scholarships and bursaries in Australia

SUMMARY REPORT

Rural Health West

Rural Health West is the trading name for the Western Australian Centre for Remote and Rural Medicine Limited. Rural Health West is a not-for-profit, membership-based organisation overseen by a Board of Directors. As this State's rural health workforce agency, the organisation receives core funding from the Australian Government Department of Health and the Western Australian Department of Health to deliver its core business activities of recruitment and retention of the medical, dental, nursing and allied health workforce in rural and remote Western Australia.

This review identifies and describes the range of current bursaries and scholarship programs intended to encourage students to consider a rural health career.

1. The Bush Bursaries and Country Women's Association Scholarship

Discipline	Medicine
Funding body	Rural Councils/Country Women's Association administered by New South Wales Rural Doctors Network.
Aim of scheme	Placement combines the enjoyable aspects of country life and rural medicine and encourages students to consider a rural medicine career.
Length of scheme	One year
Financial value	\$3,000 towards the costs associated with applicants' studies.
Student requirements	 Students must: be an Australian or New Zealand citizen or a permanent resident of Australia; be enrolled in a first year medical degree at The University of Sydney, University of Wollongong, The University of Notre Dame Australia (Sydney) or the Australian National University; be in a second year of study at The University of Newcastle Australia, University of New South Wales Australia or University of Western Sydney; and demonstrate an interest in rural practice and lifestyle.
Rural service/student commitments	Applicants spend two weeks on a rural placement in country New South Wales during their university holidays.
Benefits to students	Provides students with an opportunity to experience rural medicine, health care and the rural lifestyle and community.

2. John Flynn Placement Program*

Discipline	Medicine
Funding body	Australian Government Department of Health.
Aim of scheme	To attract more doctors to rural and remote areas to address areas of workforce shortage and improve the quality of health care for local communities.
Length of scheme	Four years
Financial value	Up to \$4,000 over the four years (covers the cost of travel and accommodation for students to go on rural placements).
Student requirements	 Applicants must: be an Australian citizen or permanent resident; currently be enrolled in an accredited medical course at one of the 20 participating universities; and be able to complete the eight weeks of placements within four years (undergraduate medical course) or in either three or four years (graduate medical course).
Rural service/student commitments	Applicants to undertake a placement in a rural or remote community for a minimum of two weeks each year for four years (students placed in the same community each year).
Benefits to students	Students are placed with a medical practitioner as a mentor and are encouraged to gain a broad understanding of the issues in rural health care within that community.

Cotton Industry Medical Scholarship 3.

Discipline	Medicine
Funding body	Gwydir Valley Cotton Grower's Association Inc., administered by New South Wales Rural Doctors Network.
Aim of scheme	Encourages students to spend time in a rural cotton growing region and consider a rural medicine career in this region.
Length of scheme	Three years
Financial value	\$5,000 per year for three years to assist with costs related to studies.
Student requirements	 Applicants must: be an Australian or New Zealand citizen or a permanent resident; be enrolled in: second year of a postgraduate medical degree; third year of a five year medical degree; fourth year of a six year medical degree; demonstrate an understanding of the realities of rural medical practice; be motivated to undertake placements in cotton growing areas in New South Wales; have an understanding of the cotton industry and/or be from a cotton growing area; and write a 300 to 500 word essay on what they hope to achieve holding the cotton industry medical scholarship.
Rural service/student commitments	Students are required to spend a minimum of two weeks of their holiday each year on a rural placement in a cotton growing region of New South Wales.
Benefits to students	Provides students with an opportunity to experience rural medicine, health care and the rural lifestyle and community.

Length of scheme	One elective
Financial value	15 scholarships spread equitably across Australia and New Zealand which offer \$500 per student towards travel and expenses.
Student requirements	Applicants must write a letter that outlines why they would like a rural scholarship and what their career plans are.
Rural service/student commitments	Complete a rural elective and upon completion of the elective submit a report to AUSSTAT and the applicant's university.

Funding body	Australian Medical Students' Association and the National Rural Health Students Network.
Aim of scheme	Bursary gives students the opportunity to receive funding to assist them complete a rural elective.
Length of scheme	One elective
Financial value	Each bursary is valued at \$250 to \$1,000 and is designed to assist with the cost of planning and undertaking an elective.
Student requirements	 Applicants must: be enrolled in an Australian medical school; be a member of a rural health club; and complete an application and include details about the elective as well as a statement on the motivation for the placement focusing on Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander health.
Rural service/student commitments	 Requirements: Minimum four week elective placement with an Indigenous health service provider within Australia. Submission of a 750 word report outlining experiences and the benefits of the opportunity for their personal and professional development.

Aim of scheme	Provides rural and urban allied health students with financial assistance for travel and accommodation costs for rural clinical placements.
Length of scheme	One placement
Financial value	Grants of up to \$750 are available to assist students with travel and accommodation costs for their rural clinical placements.
Student requirements	Students must:
	 be enrolled in an allied health course, second year or higher;
	 be a resident of New South Wales and enrolled as a full-time student at a New South Wales university; and
	 secure a placement in a 'rural' area covered by a rural Local Health District.
Rural service/student commitments	Completing a rural clinical placement.
Benefits to students	Provides students with an opportunity and funding to complete a rural clinical placement.

Discipline	Nursing and allied health
Funding body	Australian Government Department of Health administered by Services for Australian Rural and Remote Allied Health (SARRAH) for the allied health component and the Australian College of Nursing for the nursing component.
Aim of scheme	Provides financial assistance for clinical placements in a variety of allied health practices including Aboriginal Medical Services, community health care centres, hospitals, public or private practices or a combination of these.
Length of scheme	One placement
Financial value	Scholarship funding of up to \$500 per week for up to six weeks to be used for food, accommodation and living expenses.
Student requirements	 Students must: be an Australian citizen or permanent resident of Australia; be enrolled as a full-time or part-time student in an accredited, approved Australian undergraduate, postgraduate, doctorate level eligible allied health course; and undertake clinical placements (minimum one week to maximum six weeks) in an Australian rural or remote community within the calendar year in which they are funded.
Rural service/student commitments	Must complete the clinical placement in a rural or remote Australian community with an Australian Standard Geographical Classification – Remoteness Area rating between 2 and 5 for one to six weeks.

Funding body	National Rural Health Alliance (NRHA)
Aim of scheme	The RAMUS Scheme assists selected students with a rural background to study medicine at university. It aims to increase the number of doctors practising in rural and remote communities across Australia and improve the sustainability of the rural health workforce.
Length of scheme	Length of degree
Financial value	\$10,000 per year during the completion of a standard medical degree. For accommodation, living and travel costs (scheme not bonded, students not required to work in a rural area after graduation).
Student requirements	Students must:
	 be an Australian citizen or permanent resident of Australia;
	 have lived in a defined Australian rural area for a minimum of five consecutive years, or eight cumulative years, from their fifth birthday up to the time of starting their medical degree;
	 be enrolled or have applied to study in an accredited Australian undergraduate or graduate-entry medical degree;
	 not be receiving other scholarships, bursaries or cadetships worth more than \$7,000 each year; and
	 show commitment to working in rural Australia in the future (stated intentions, demonstrated previous experience of and/or commitment to rural communities).
	Students are selected on the basis of financial need.
Rural service/student commitments	Undertake appropriate rural activities, have a rural doctor as a mentor, be a member of the university's student rural health club and are strongly encouraged to participate in rural activities (supervised clinical activities in rural areas, promoting careers in health to rural school students).

Funding body	The Land and Rural Doctors' Association of New South Wales
Aim of scheme	To encourage more country students to study (or continue studying) medicine.
Length of scheme	One year
Financial value	\$7,500
Student requirements	 Students must: be an Australian citizen or a permanent resident; write a 2,000 word essay incorporating why they are studying medicine, career goals and an understanding of the role and value of rural doctors in Australia; ordinarily reside in a rural or regional area of New South Wales, greater than 50 kilometres from the nearest university offering a medical degree; be currently enrolled at an Australian medical school in the first year of medicine or have successfully completed at least their first year of medicine; provide a letter of support from the principal of their high school or another senior person within their local community; and cannot be a recipient of another scholarship.
Rural service/student commitments	Pass rate in all subjects. Maintain contact with mentor on a regular basis (at least monthly) to ensure a continued interest in and connection to rural medicine.

Financial value	\$250 to \$1,000
Student requirements	 Students must: be enrolled in an Australian medical school; be a member of their rural health club; and write an application that includes elective location, date of elective, length of elective, what aspects of elective the funding will be used to support and a 750 word essay. Recipients of a John Flynn Scholarship, past Australian Medical Students' Association bursary and member of the current Australian Medical Students' Association Executive are ineligible.
Rural service/student commitments	 Requirements: Minimum four week elective placement. Elective must be undertaken in a rural health setting or with an Indigenous health service provider within Australia. Submission of a 750 word report outlining experiences and benefits of the opportunity at completion of placement.

	 be going into second year or above of an undergraduate degree at any Australian university studying a health-related discipline; and
	 submit a written application including a 500 word essay.

Student requirements	Students must: • be enrolled in a Bachelor of Nursing degree as a full-time student at a New South Wales university; and • must be a resident of New South Wales.
Rural service/student commitments	Completing a clinical placement.

Student requirements	 Students must: be of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent or identify as an Australian Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander and be accepted by the community in which he or she lives or has lived; be enrolled full-time at an Australian medical school and have successfully completed at least their first year of medicine; maintain satisfactory performance judged on results achieved; and provide a statement describing aspirations, purpose in studying medicine and uses to which applicant hopes to put medical training.

	 be living in rural New South Wales and reside within the boundaries of Berry, Maitland and Lithgow for more than five years, within the last ten years;
	be an Australian citizen or permanent resident living in New South Wales;

	 intend to practise in a rural location as a registered nurse or midwife when studies are completed; and
